About This Book

This manual contains information on the ISA 33.6/56K Data/Fax Modem for Windows. The manual is divided into the following parts:

Part 1: Quick Installation Guide

This part of the manual covers the installation of your Data/Fax/Voice modem, and is split up into three sections:

Hardware Installation Software Driver Installation for either: Windows 3.1/Windows 3.11 on page 1-3 Windows 95 on page 1-3 Application Software Installation on page 1-4

The first section applies to the installation of the hardware, and the second two sections apply to either Windows 3.1/3.11 or Windows 95. In all cases, the hardware installation *must* be followed by the software driver installation. The ISA Modem for Windows requires both the hardware and software be installed properly to work. The last step involved is installation of the application software that will enable the operation of the modem for Data/Voice and DSVD (**D**igital **Simultaneous Voice and Data**).

Hardware Installation

Before getting started, make sure that you have the following items that were included with your package:

- Modem
- Communications Software
- RJ11 Phone Cord
- Support diskette containing drivers
- A headset to be used for accessing the voice capabilities of the modem.
- This Guide

In addition, you will need a Phillips head screwdriver or a 1/4" Hex screwdriver.

Be sure that you have an available 8- or 16-bit expansion slot in your computer.

The ISA Modem for Windows supports "Plug and Play" operation. There are no jumpers or switches on the modem that need to be set before installing the modem into your computer.

Installing the Modem

- 1. Review the safety information provided at the end of this document before beginning the installation.
- 2. Turn off and unplug your computer and any peripheral devices, such as a printer.
- 3. Remove the computer's cover. Refer to the computer manual, if necessary, to see which rear panel screws to remove before sliding the cover off.
- 4. Unscrew and remove the solid bracket at the back of any available ISA expansion slot.
- Insert the modem board into the slot you have chosen, with the gold leads on the modem board's edge firmly in the slot's groove.
- 6. Once the modem is in place, screw the bracket at the back of the modem firmly to the computer's rear panel. This ensures that the modem board is firmly in place.
- 7. Replace the computer cover and all its screws. Reattach all cables and power cords.
- 8. If you currently have a phone plugged into the wall jack, disconnect it. Plug one end of the phone cable that came with the modem into the TELCO jack at the rear of the modem. Plug the other end of the cable into the wall jack.
- 9. If you wish to use the voice capabilities of the modem, install the headset shipped with your modem. Installation instructions for the headset are provided with the headset.

10. This completes the modem hardware installation.

If you are installing for Windows 3.1/3.11 then go to "Installing Drivers for Windows 3.1/3.11" on page 1-3. If you are installing for Windows 95, then go to "Installing Drivers for Windows 95" on page 1-3.

Installing Drivers for Windows 3.1/3.11

The following steps should be performed in order to install the driver software for the modem:

- 1. Insert the installation diskette.
- 2. Select the **File** pulldown menu located at the top left of the **Program Manager**.
- 3. Select Run....
- 4. Type a:\install (if a: is your 3.5" diskette drive.)
- 5. Follow the prompts from the installation program.
- 6. One of the prompts will ask you to select an available COM port. Select one that is free and press *OK*. You can use the **MSD** application in a DOS window to determine which COM ports are already being used.
- 7. At the conclusion of the installation, you will find a ISA Modem for Windows group in the Windows Program Manager window.

You are now ready to install the communications software provided with the modem. Please refer to the manual accompanying the software for information concerning installation and operation of that software.

Installing Drivers for Windows 95

The following steps should be performed in order to install the driver software for the modem:

- Once the modem has been physically installed in the system, Windows 95 should come up with the "New Hardware Found" screen.
- 2. At this screen select the *Driver from disk provided by hardware manufacturer*.
- 3. Insert the ISA Modem for Windows diskette into your diskette drive and click the *OK* button.
- 4. The next screen will confirm that you are installing initialization software for the ISA Modem for Windows. Click *OK*.
- 5. An Installation screen will pop up telling you that the system is installing the drivers for the ISA Modem for Windows.
- 6. Wait for the installation of the driver software to complete.
- 7. The next screen will tell you which communications port the ISA Modem for Windows was assigned.
- 8. You now have to restart Windows 95 for the installation to complete.

You are now ready to install the communications software provided with the modem. Please refer to the manual accompanying the software for information concerning installation and operation of that software.

Installing the Application Software

The application software that was provided with your modem package allows you to take advantage of voice and data capabilities of the modem. Please refer to the manual accompanying the software for information concerning installation and operation of that software.

The Command Reference section includes information about the following:

Command Summary

- Type commands in either upper or lower case, not a combination. Use the Backspace key to delete errors. (You cannot delete the original AT command since it is not stored in the modem buffer.)
- If a command has numeric options and you don't include a number, zero is assumed. For example, if you type ATB, the command ATB0 is assumed.
- Every command but A/, +++ and A> must begin with the AT prefix and be entered by pressing a carriage return (Enter key).

• The maximum command length is 60 characters. The modem doesn't count the AT prefix, carriage returns, or spaces.

Appendix B. Help and Service Information

Before calling, please prepare for your call by following these steps.

Step 1: Troubleshooting

You might be able to solve the problem yourself. If you observe one of the following problems, one of the associated responses might fix the problem.

- 1. Make sure that your telephone cord is plugged correctly from the modem to the telephone jack.
- 2. Make sure that you have followed the instructions in this manual for installation of drivers.
- 3. If you are using a headset with the modem, and are also using a sound board, make sure that the cabling between the modem and sound board is correct.

Step 2: Preparing for the Call

To assist the technical support representative, have available as much of the following information as possible:

- 1. Computer manufacturer and computer model
- 2. Option name: ISA 33.6/56K Data/Fax Modem for Windows
- 3. Proof of purchase
- 4. Exact wording of the error message (if any)
- 5. Description of the problem
- 6. Hardware and software configuration information for your system

If possible, be at your computer. Your technical support representative might want to walk you through the problem during the call.

Statement of Limited Warranty

The warranties provided by IBM in this Statement of Limited Warranty apply only to Machines you originally purchase for your use, and not for resale, from IBM or your reseller. The term "Machine" means an IBM machine, its features, conversions, upgrades, elements, or accessories, or any combination of them. Unless IBM specifies otherwise, the following warranties apply only in the country where you acquire the Machine. If you have any questions, contact IBM or your reseller.

Production Status

Each Machine is manufactured from new parts, or new and used parts. In some cases, the Machine may not be new and may have been previously installed. Regardless of the Machine's production status, IBM's warranty terms apply.

The IBM Warranty for Machines

IBM warrants that each Machine 1) is free from defects in materials and workmanship and 2) conforms to IBM's Official Published Specifications. The warranty period for a Machine is a specified, fixed period commencing on its Date of Installation. The date on your receipt is the Date of Installation, unless IBM or your reseller informs you otherwise.

During the warranty period IBM or your reseller, if authorized by IBM, will provide warranty service under the type of service designated for the Machine and will manage and install engineering changes that apply to the Machine.

For IBM or your reseller to provide warranty service for a feature, conversion, or upgrade, IBM or your reseller may require that the Machine on which it is installed be 1) for certain Machines, the designated, serial-numbered Machine and 2) at an engineering-change level compatible with the feature, conversion, or upgrade.
